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Letter from the Vice-Chancellor



The Clarence Centre for Enterprise and Innovation injected £37 million into the local economy last year. We can truly say that LSBU is London's enterprising university.

It is my pleasure to welcome you to the latest edition of *With Our Thanks*, London South Bank University's annual publication created especially for our donors.

LSBU has always been at the forefront of access to education. To enable our students to achieve their potential, we must make them feel at home, help them connect with their studies and encourage them to take an active part in LSBU life. In doing so we will help them to succeed and shape their future lives. Through your gifts of money, time and experience you are helping us to do just that. Thank you.

I want LSBU to be seen as an enterprising civic university, addressing real world challenges. One way to achieve this is to equip our students with the confidence to create and build their own businesses; last year over 4,500 LSBU students were supported by the Student Enterprise Team to develop their enterprise skills.

Our investment in enterprise is paying off: The Clarence Centre for Enterprise and Innovation houses over 50 student businesses, which last year injected £37million into the local economy and created 50 new jobs. Added to this, 22% of our graduates own their own business. We can truly say that LSBU is London's enterprising university.

Our link with employers is as crucial as it ever has been: LSBU has 1,000 employer partners, which each year fund the education and training of over 6,700 part-time and full-time students, paying their fees, providing training in the workplace and funding time away from work. However, employer sponsored students only account for 37% of our student body. The rest have to make critical decisions on how they fund their studies and for those who find themselves in financial hardship, your gifts enable us to help them stay and finish their degrees. Again, thank you.

Our alumni and friends have been working with us to ensure that LSBU students gain valuable experience in the workplace: by offering internships and work placements within their own businesses, and by taking time to visit the University and meet bright students who could be employees of the future. The fact that starting salaries for LSBU graduates are in the top 15 of all universities is no coincidence: our relationships with business are adding real value to an LSBU degree. For all of our supporters who have volunteered their time and expertise in the last year, I hope it has been a rewarding experience for you both personally and professionally. It has certainly been rewarding for the students.

I hope that by reading *With our Thanks* you will see your donations and other support as an investment in London South Bank University and in our students.

- **LSBU's Students' Union** is working with the student body to reduce financial anxiety in the private rental market. The Ready to Rent initiative is developing a programme to understand the specific housing issues LSBU students face. These issues will be widely promoted to all students so that they have the knowledge to fight any injustice they face within the rental market.
- **SimVenture** is a business simulation tool, which gives users the opportunity to make business decisions based on simulated business scenarios. This develops their understanding of running a business and provides a safe environment in which to learn. Students and academics are able to use this software for assessed modules within the curriculum and as part of challenges and competitions outside the curriculum. - **Postgraduate students can apply for Vice-Chancellor's Scholarships** under these categories:
 - Excellence: designed for high achieving students who have achieved a first class degree

 - Alumni: designed for LSBU graduates who are not eligible for any other student discount

Victoria Akindoye | LL.M International Human Rights & Development

Victoria Akindoye spent over 20 years working across public, private, charity, faith-based and education sectors until she was made redundant in 2010. “It was a difficult time for me” she says. “Five days later, my husband and I separated. We later divorced and I found myself claiming Jobseekers’ Allowance for a year. It felt as though my life was passing me by so I decided to retrain and try a new career path. It turned out to be the best decision I’ve ever made”.

Victoria spent time looking for the right opportunity, eventually deciding to study LLB (Hons) Law at LSBU after attending an Open Day. After three years of hard work, Victoria graduated in 2014 – but she wasn’t finished there.

“I decided to study the LL.M International Human Rights & Development. Having researched the course, I felt confident that it would help me to become a specialist in international human rights, giving me the tools I need to make a difference.”

To fund her studies, Victoria applied for the Vice-Chancellor’s Scholarship in the Community category, which is open to graduates with a good degree who have made a significant contribution to the local community in Lambeth, Southwark, Lewisham or Wandsworth.

Thanks to her outstanding record of helping the community in a variety of ways, she was successful. Of course, when she found out, she was ecstatic: “It really lifted my spirits and made me realise that all the extra-curricular activities I had undertaken during my undergraduate degree had been recognised. The letter from the Vice-Chancellor informing me of my award really captured the essence of my active student life at LSBU”.

The award made a great difference to Victoria because she was already considering alternative sources of funds. “Some of the alternatives weren’t ideal – such as borrowing from friends or family, or even having to defer to another academic year”. Instead, Victoria now intends to put the skills the scholarship is enabling her to acquire to good use in the future.

“I want to be a unifying force in the world, bridging the gap between the good and the not-so-good people of this world. I want to educate those who don’t know right from wrong as well as those who know the difference, but choose the wrong path. The Scholarship from LSBU has given me the opportunity to further my studies and hopefully make that dream a reality”.

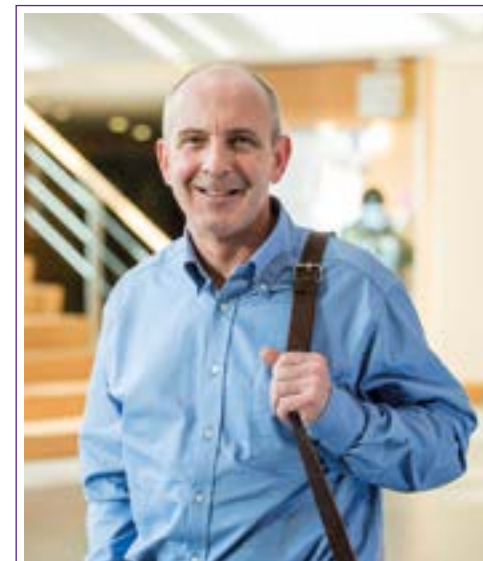
Reginald Johnston | MSc Addiction Psychology & Counselling

Reginald Johnston had already had two careers before he started his degree at LSBU. After a four-year apprenticeship, he became an electrician at 19 and worked in the trade for almost a decade. He then joined the Metropolitan Police where he worked as a uniformed officer as well as spells in CID, the Missing Persons Unit, and Counter Terrorism.

Reginald looks back fondly on his career but he always felt his education was incomplete, so in 2002 he enrolled as a part-time undergraduate. This was quite an undertaking for Reginald, who studied while working full-time and with two young children. “I’m incredibly proud that I graduated from my LLB (Hons) Law with a 2:1. I think part of the reason for that is because I had felt for a long time that such undertakings were ‘only for other people’ so it was a wonderful feeling to be able to demonstrate to my children that education can be a lifelong, fun adventure.”

Thoughts quickly turned to postgraduate study and Reginald knew LSBU was the ideal place for him. “I knew the quality of the teaching staff and facilities, and the location was ideal as well. I spoke to some people who were already studying the course I wanted to do, MSc in Addiction Psychology & Counselling, and they were very positive about it. The fact that LSBU was competitive on price without compromising on quality or reputation was also a very important factor.”

Despite the competitive pricing, Reginald was keen to explore other funding avenues and discovered that LSBU graduates with a 2:1 undergraduate degree or higher can apply



for a Vice-Chancellor’s Scholarship, which takes the form of a £1,000 bursary to help with the costs of study. “I was absolutely elated to discover I had been granted an alumni scholarship. I felt valued, enthused and vindicated in my choice of university, the course I am studying, and my belief that what I had accomplished pre- and post-graduation was recognised as meaningful and worthwhile.”

Reginald aims to carry his enthusiasm for his course into his third career. “I want to be an excellent Addiction Counsellor [and] use my own life experiences and continued personal growth to help others make positive changes in their lives. Can there be a better contribution to society that to help people to move from addiction – with all that entails – to becoming happier members of society?”

Scholarships



Amna Riaz | MSc Development Studies

Amna Riaz was born in the Punjab and was brought up in quite “a conservative place where girls furthering their education and studying at university is not thought to be a good thing”. Luckily, Amna’s family saw things differently: “My family – especially my parents – supported my decision to study and I made it through my undergraduate degree thanks to scholarships and loans as well as [my parents] help and support”.

Amna received a distinction for her degree at COMSATS Institute of Information and Technology. She also won a number of national achievements during her time there for debates and essay writing. Upon graduating, Amna was unable to pursue her Masters overseas because of financial challenges that made it unaffordable for her.

“Instead, I was offered a position at COMSATS as a Research Associate and

Lecturer so I started my career there. I also worked as an intern at a telecoms company and as a volunteer in national and private institutions for public service, where I was shortlisted for some international training funded by the British Council. I eventually returned home, joining the University of Central Punjab where I became a Senior Academic Manager.”

Amna’s desire to study overseas remained undimmed throughout these professional triumphs. The projects she had worked on raised her awareness of different aspects of health and education and she decided she wanted to study MSc Development Studies at LSBU.

There were many reasons why Amna thought LSBU was the right place for her. “The modules all looked really interesting and the department has an excellent reputation; the facilities, support and extra-curricular activities on offer really appealed to me. I already had friends in London so I knew I would feel at home immediately.”

Finance was still an issue for Amna so she used her educational achievements to apply for a Vice-Chancellor’s Scholarship in the Excellence category, which is open to those with a first-class honours degree (or equivalent) who can show academic, practical and professional achievements. News that she had been successful came at just the right time as Amna was considering deferring her studies for another semester.

Amna hopes that she can apply what she learns at LSBU to help make a positive change by becoming a development worker. “I’ve seen a lot of social and economic friction in my life and want to make life easier for those looking to follow my path to education”.

Student Enterprise



LSBU student entrepreneur, Chris Underdown, has already come up with an award-winning idea. Chris has won £6,000 at the London Entrepreneurs’ Challenge to develop Choosic, a new music recommendation app designed in collaboration with entrepreneurs from UCL and Goldsmiths.

While in his second year on the BA Sonic Media course, Chris began researching digital music distribution for his degree and was inspired to develop Choosic. “There are plenty of places to listen to and stream music but now we have a problem discovering new music. We need something to refine and filter music choices,” explains Chris.

This is where Choosic comes in. “I did market research and the idea came from the question: ‘How can I solve

this problem?’ We surveyed nearly 350 students and found that 80% wished there was a better way to discover music so we saw an opportunity.

“I didn’t know about the Student Enterprise team at LSBU but now think the Clarence Centre for Enterprise and Innovation is the best thing about LSBU!”

Chris developed his business on Student Enterprise’s Spark scheme, which provides funding, office space and advice to student entrepreneurs while they study. He also competed in the LSBU business plan competition and finished runner up before pursuing the London Entrepreneurs’ Challenge.

Chris says: “The Challenge is good preparation for pitching in front of investors. My presentation skills have really improved from these kinds of competitions. I come from a creative and ideas background so my business expertise was vague. I got a lot of support on the business side of things from LSBU.”

Chris is receiving further support on LSBU’s Rocket scheme, a six month programme where students and graduates receive intensive support through mentoring and workshops delivered by investors, business experts and successful entrepreneurs.

Chris’s plan for Choosic is ambitious: “We aim to be a top discovery tool for our consumers and an A&R tool for the music industry”. There is every reason to believe this will happen for Chris and for Choosic.

Enterprise is not just about starting a business; it’s about recognising opportunities and seizing them. LSBU Student Enterprise creates an environment for students and alumni to learn entrepreneurial skills and gain the confidence to start and grow successful businesses. Rami Ranger



Dr Rami Ranger has always tried to inspire change in his own way; at LSBU he has done this by championing innovation and entrepreneurship with a generous gift of £250,000.

As a successful global entrepreneur, Rami understands the importance of education and entrepreneurship. He says: 'Where I am today is a far cry from where I started. Education enriched and shaped the futures of myself and my siblings. I started with nothing and now have the

opportunity to help others make the most of their lives.'

It is important to look at where Rami started and how much he has achieved in his career because his journey is replicated in many of our students' stories. Rami was born two months after the political assassination of his father and he started life in a refugee camp with his mother and 7 siblings. Although his mother was not able to provide financial stability, she was able to instil in him the right values that were to lead to his success.

These values helped him found Sun Mark Ltd, which he started in the 1970s with just £2, a typewriter, a car and a self-storage unit. Sun Mark is now the only company to have ever won the Queen's Award for Enterprise for International Trade five times in a row and Rami himself was named Director of the Year 2013 by the Institute of Directors.

Rami has been determined to use philanthropy to help others in their own pursuit of education and entrepreneurial success. His gift has been used to set up a fund for enterprise excellence at LSBU, which

will award money to both a graduate and a student entrepreneur each year, alongside an Investment Fund that will provide loans for start-up businesses wanting to move to the next level.

In addition, LSBU has established the Dr Rami Ranger MBE Centre for Graduate Entrepreneurship, which provides a hub and workspace for students and graduates on enterprise programmes.

Rami's decision to support LSBU was based on our diverse student population. 'So many different cultures, colours, religions are working here. This is the ideal place for me, as an immigrant, to come here and show other immigrants that success is possible. Britain is a land of great opportunities and with the five golden principles; self-respect, work

ethic, commitment, vision and empathy, everything is possible.'

Rami hopes his gift will empower people through education and enable them to free their imaginations, which in turn will help make their aspirations come to fruition. He further hopes that other entrepreneurs will follow suit and support our educational institutions.

LSBU Vice-Chancellor, Professor David Phoenix said: 'The University thanks Dr Rami Ranger for his generous donation to support our enterprise activities. His entrepreneurial spirit is shared by LSBU and is something we embed in our own ethos by building real-world experience into every aspect of our curriculum, nurturing the students' confidence and self-belief – the very strength that has helped to make Rami Ranger the success he is today'.

LSBU Architecture Exhibition



Each year, LSBU's Architecture students, both undergraduate and postgraduate, have the opportunity to present their work at their annual exhibition. The exhibition is a visual feast of drawings, scaled models and films, and is informed by students' engagement with London, its citizens and its culture.

This year, the exhibition caught the eye of Braeburn Estates, a joint venture combining Canary Wharf Group and Qatari Diar. Amongst other projects, Braeburn Estates has embarked upon the redevelopment of the Shell Centre complex on the South Bank, just over a mile away from LSBU's Southwark campus. So it was especially exciting that Braeburn Estates came to see some of our students' finest ideas up close, and to provide prizes for some of their best work.

"We are always looking for new and innovative ideas to incorporate into our developments," said a spokesperson for the company. "So we are delighted to have the opportunity to meet some of the next generation of young architects and to award prizes during the show."

And they were impressed by what they saw. "The students managed to show flair and imagination, with an artistic sensibility. They

also demonstrated an understanding of what will actually work in the real world."

Winners from this year's show included undergraduate Wing Hang Tang, and postgraduate diploma students Duane De Gale and Dharmin Gandhi. According to Lily Kudic, Course Director for the Postgraduate Diploma in Architecture, "The new student prizes Braeburn Estates donated added extra atmosphere to the exhibition opening, and a real sense of achievement for the winners."

But that's not all. Braeburn Estates felt that the quality of the projects was so high that they decided to sponsor an additional design competition.

The winning student architect will receive £1,000 and the chance to have his or her design displayed as part of the hoarding for South Bank Place, Braeburn Estates' redevelopment of the Shell Centre Site at Waterloo.

In a final endorsement of our students, Braeburn Estates said: "We look forward to working with the University in the next few years. If this is the future of British architecture then there is real reason for optimism".

Funding for Nurses



A health organisation has given £128,000 to provide personal and professional support for newly qualified and trainee nurses working in north and east London communities.

The project, which is being developed for Health Education North Central and East London (HENCEL), is specifically aimed at practice nurses and district nurses who provide care to patients in their own homes or in residential nursing homes. The project has been set up to ease the transition of newly qualified nurses to the reality of community nursing practice.

Nurses will get one-to-one professional mentoring, life coaching and access to a new online support network that lets them ask for help, share experiences and pool resources.

"Working as a nurse in the community can be very demanding, unpredictable and isolating," says Sue Boran, Senior Lecturer in Community Healthcare at LSBU. "There is an urgent need to give nurses local educational support to develop their skills, competence and confidence."

"LSBU has a long history of providing top-quality programmes and recognising the importance of work-based learning for nurses in community settings. We are moving towards even more integrated working, which HENCEL's funding will enable us to further develop."

Volunteering in the Spotlight

Two LSBU students have been recognised for their contribution to local communities at a time when volunteering has seen a decline across the UK.

Mark Conteh, an Accounting and Finance student, and Troy Shepperd, an Electrical and Electronic Engineering student, were presented with Southwark Stars Awards for completing more than 100 hours of volunteering support to Southwark communities within the last 12 months.



On the other hand, Troy has been using his passion for music as a tool to create a community, and has started the LSBU DJ society. The group enables people with similar interests in music to socialise, hold events and lead workshops enabling students to learn and develop their DJing skills.

Troy says: “This opportunity has given me the chance to improve my communication, networking and organisation skills whilst helping people and making new friends all at the same time.”

More than 600 students have signed up to volunteer since the student volunteering programme started with more than 150 organisations partnering with the University.

Mark has been using experience from his course to volunteer as a Finance Manager for 3rdthought Arts Collective, a project particularly focused on engaging older people in activities in their local community. Mark says: “As well as helping others, I see volunteering as a way of gaining the experience and knowledge employers are looking for, whilst also being an opportunity to develop skills and to work with people from a wide range of backgrounds”.
