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### **Response:**

- 1. There is no specific policy or guidance for this

- 3. The Extenuating Circumstances (EC) Policy automatically provides students with the following support:
  - Coursework: all students are granted an automatic uncapped 5-working-day extension from the original submission deadline. If they are unable to submit within this period, they may submit during the resit period for an uncapped mark. No EC claim is required for coursework extensions or resit submissions
  - Exams: Students who miss or fail the main attempt will automatically receive an uncapped resit opportunity, without needing to submit an EC claim.

Therefore, students do not need to submit an EC claim for coursework extensions or resit opportunities.

4. If a student requires additional support beyond the standard 5-working-day extension, or uncapped resit, they may submit and EC request with official evidence covering the assessment period; period and pre-menstrual cramps will fall under the health conditions in the EC policy, however this must be supported by official medical evidence from the NHS or their GP.

If you wish to request a review, please set out in writing your reasons and send it within 2 months of the date of this letter to the Group Chief People and Legal Officer, London South Bank University, 103 Borough Road, London, SE1 0AA. We will aim to carry out the review within 20 working days, or in exceptional circumstances within 40 working days.
